Fourth Sunday of Advent Lighting of the Advent Wreath

Celebrant: Today, on the fourth Sunday of Advent, we also light the candle of Love. Love is patient, love is kind. Love is never rude or selfish. Love is not quick to take offense and keeps no records of wrongs. Love rejoices in the right, the good, and the true. There is no limit to its faith, to its hope, or to its endurance. Love never ends.

People: God's perfect love is revealed to us in Jesus, for God so loved the world that he sent Jesus into the world, so that whoever believes in him should not perish, but have eternal life.

Celebrant: We light this candle today to remind us that God is love. We thank God for the hope he gives us, for the peace he shares with us, for the joy he pours into our hearts, and for the love that redeems us and shows us the way.

Light the fourth candle of LOVE

Celebrant: Let us pray:

People: Loving God, we thank you for your gift of love - shown to us perfectly in Jesus Christ our Lord. Help us prepare our hearts to receive Him. Bless our worship. Help us to hear and do your word. We ask it in the name of the one born in Bethlehem. Amen.

A READING FROM THE LETTER TO THE HEBREWS

Consequently, when Christ came into the world, he said, "Sacrifices and offerings you have not desired, but a body you have prepared for me; in burnt offerings and sin offerings you have taken no pleasure. Then I said, 'See, God, I have come to do your will, O God' (in the scroll of the book it is written of me)."

When he said above, "You have neither desired nor taken pleasure in sacrifices and offerings and burnt offerings and sin offerings" (these are offered according to the law), then he added, "See, I have come to do your will." He abolishes the first in order to establish the second.

And it is by God's will that we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all.

THE HOLY GOSPEL: Luke 1:39-55

THE HOLY GOSPEL OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO LUKE

People: Glory to You Lord Jesus Christ

In those days Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth.

When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leaped in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and exclaimed with a loud cry, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb.

And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leaped for joy. And, blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what was spoken to her by the Lord."

And Mary said, "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has looked with favor on the lowliness of his servant. Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name.

His mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation. He has shown strength with his arm; he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts. He has brought down the powerful from their thrones and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things and sent the rich away empty.

He has helped his servant Israel, in remembrance of his mercy, according to the promise he made to our ancestors, to Abraham and to his descendants forever."

The Gospel of Christ.

People: Praise to You Lord Jesus Christ

<u>The magnificence of obedience</u> Micah 5:205a; Psalm 80:1-7; Hebrews 10:5-10; Luke1:39-55

Christian faith often gets presented to us as a life of sacrifice. We often get asked the question, "What do I need to give up in order to be a follower of Jesus?" In essence we present the Christian life as one of denial – one in which we give stuff up in some grandly sacrificial way in order to prove how faithful we are. In essence we then value folk, like St. Francis of Assisi or Mother Theresa, because they have given up so much in order to serve God. We glorify their sacrificial commitment and hold it up as a key value, without recognizing the value that precedes it and that is really the basis of all the life-style choices we make – namely obedience.

In essence the Christian worldview does not start with the question, "What can I sacrifice for God?" It starts with the question "How can I obey God?" Part of that life of obedience might ask us to act sacrificially but living sacrificially is the product of obedience.

The obedience of Christ

In I Samuel King Saul is commanded to go into battle against the Amalekites and told to completely destroy them by the prophet Samuel. But Saul, in his own wisdom, decided that it would be worthwhile to destroy the people and to keep all their wealth. On their way back home, they encounter Samuel who asks why they had kept this wealth in livestock, Saul responds that they had kept it in order to sacrifice to God. Samuel responds, "Does the Lord delight in burnt offerings and sacrifices as much as obeying the voice of the Lord? To obey is better than sacrifice, and to heed is better than the fat of rams' (I Samuel 15:22).

The writer of the letter to the Hebrews picks up on that same theme in talking of Christ offering himself once for all. He draws on Psalm 40 and in doing so points out that the central theme of Christ's life is not sacrifice, but obedience. In reference to the Psalm, Christ fulfills both the Law and the constant reminder of our sinfulness or fractured existence that the ritual of sacrifice offered. In this sense what Christ offered us in obedience was the ultimate shout-out of our fracturedness and the ultimate conclusion to its resolve. The emphasis here is not on what Christ sacrificed, as significant as that was, but rather on the obedience (even to death) to God that he displayed.

In essence Christ embodied the Psalm - "I have come to do your will" – in the incarnation that we remember at Christmas. It is in this sense that Christ demonstrated true obedience in living all of life in humble submission to God. It is this very point that the writer of Philippians is making when he suggests to us that Christ emptied himself in the incarnation as an act of obedience. It is in this sense that the entire life of Christ, not just his death, brings significance to us. That his birth is just as much an event of significance as his death and resurrection. That Christmas holds as equal value as Good Friday and Easter Sunday in the church calendar when seen from the perspective of obedience.

Then, as the writer of Hebrews indicates, our significance is not to be found in some presupposed sacrificial life, as if we could add to the fullness of what Christ offered, but in us humbly living out or embodying the will of God in our own lives (vs. 10). This embodiment of God's will is to be found in us giving ourselves over to God's grace and mercy as a simple act of surrender and submission. Thus, in contrast to us thinking we need to give ourselves sacrificially to God or for others, we need to submit ourselves to God's grace, love and favour.

Within all the warped gender stereo-types of Mary our culture has produced there is something profoundly true about the wonderful obedience Mary demonstrates. In this passage in Luke that we refer to as the Magnificent there is a starting premise for bringing Christ in the world. The starting premise is not sacrificial giving, as if Mary had to ask what she had to give up or offer, but one of pure obedience motivated by a response to God's

grace and favour. This hymn of worship begins from the premise of Mary, as an act of obedience, in receiving God's grace – "he has looked with favour on the lowliness of his servant" (vs.48).

This obedience does not make Mary some form of wretched, pitiful character who is flagellated by self-denial and on whom God takes pity. Rather she is one who in obedient submission finds herself blessed by God and humanity. It is for this very reason that her cousin Elizabeth proclaims, "Blessed are you amongst women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb" (vs.42).

So where does true obedience come from then? A sense of guilt or duty or something else? True obedience is found in love – it is a call to love and a response based on love. The writer of the letter to the church in Corinth points out, "If I give all us possess to the poor and surrender my body to the flames" – in other words offer the greatest level of sacrifice – "but have not love, I gain nothing'(13:3). In other words, even obedience to death that is not motivated by love is worthless!

Both Mary and Christ demonstrate to us the true nature of obedience motivated by love and devotion – Mary in her willingness to bring Christ into the world and Christ in his willingness to enter our world through the incarnation.

Christmas can be such a confusing time of year because of the great emphasis it puts on giving – the idea of us giving sacrificially for others. But in a sense, it is much easier for us to give sacrificially than it is to simply abandon ourselves to God in obedience. It is probably much easier, and probably more logical to us, to respond to the constant requests to give and to see Advent as a build up to us giving at Christmas, than it would be for us to see Advent as a season of penance that brings us to obedience. But the very nature of Advent is to bring us to that point of humble submission to God motivated by the recognition that we do so in response to God's love and mercy to us. My hope and prayer is that we would find a renewed sense of desire to walk in simple submission to the love and grace of God this Christmas.

People: Amen
