THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

A READING FROM THE BOOK OF ACTS 19:1-10

While Apollos was in Corinth, Paul passed through the inland regions and came to Ephesus, where he found some disciples. He said to them, 'Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you became believers?' They replied, 'No, we have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit.' Then he said, 'Into what then were you baptized?' They answered, 'Into John's baptism.'

Paul said, 'John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, in Jesus.' On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. When Paul had laid his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied—altogether there were about twelve of them.

He entered the synagogue and for three months spoke out boldly and argued persuasively about the kingdom of God. When some stubbornly refused to believe and spoke evil of the Way before the congregation, he left them, taking the disciples with him, and argued daily in the lecture hall of Tyrannus. This continued for two years, so that all the residents of Asia, both Jews and Greeks, heard the word of the Lord.

GOSPEL: Mark 8:34-9:1

THE HOLY GOSPEL OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO MARK

People: Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life?

Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels.' And he said to them, 'Truly I tell you, there are some standing here who will not taste death until they see that the kingdom of God has come with power.'

The Gospel of Christ.

People: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

SERMON

Living with God can be amazing, and it can also be tough. It's like living with family or friends. There are going to be good times and rougher times. When we live together, we need ground rules, mutual respect, and the commitment to work through the tough times. In today's gospel, Jesus is telling us what it takes to live together in God's house. And home is the Kingdom of God. What is it like to live in God's house and have Jesus as a housemate, a friend, and a loved one? Can we live God as a housemate?

To live with God, the ultimate ground rule is to act, think, and feel with love. Jesus says, "This is the greatest commandment: Love God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. And through this, love your neighbor as yourself." This is non-negotiable. But it is not always obvious how to love.

One important aspect of love is mutual respect. Jesus tells us not to be ashamed of him or the gospel. Imagine being ashamed of your loved ones or roommate. It hurts them when we hide them from others. And it hurts us. It's stifling to our souls to not be able to express our true feelings, thoughts, and beliefs. Jesus is asking us to be real. Wherever we are, and whoever we're with, God is not someone to be ashamed of. Loving God and loving the world is good.

The trouble is that the world can shame, entice, and distract us from commitment to our homelife with God. The Kingdom of God is built up in faith. We trust that God will provide the necessities and that, together, we can work toward a just world. That's the challenge. The world is not completely just. There are people who work to provide for themselves and others. This is good. But there are those who work for large bank accounts.

Some billionaires use their money to fly to space. And they ignore others who don't have enough – enough food, health care, or shelter. The driving forces of worldly stockpiling are fear and a lack of faith.

In the Kingdom, in God's house, we are asked to care for one another. It's the central rule. And we are rewarded by the love that is exchanged. It is a transaction of the soul. In God's house, we gain wealth by giving. When we give to one another, we gain in spiritual gifts. Spiritual gifts include peace, fortitude, wisdom, piety, and understanding. And all these gifts come through our relationships of care.

When the world "out there" causes us to step away from the Kingdom or even run out on Jesus, we're still loved. Jesus assures us that he'll always come looking for us. He's like a shepherd that leaves 99 sheep behind to search for the one that is lost. God is like a father who welcomes back his disgraceful son with forgiveness, and a joyful banquet. We're always held and returning to God's loving embrace.

Faithfully coming home to God and living with the expectation to love can be challenging. And we're all learning, and we don't do it alone. It is striking that Jesus tells us to take up our crosses and follow him. But, later on, before his death, Jesus does not carry his own cross. Who carries his cross? It is Simon, who is from Cyrene, a city in North Africa. We are told that Simon is just passing by. Whether we are total strangers or intimate partners, we are not commanded to carry our burdens for God all by ourselves. They say, "Many hands make light work." In the Kingdom, God is not our only housemate – we can be loved and supported by each other.
