The Proclamation of the Word

A READING FROM THE SECOND BOOK OF PETER 3:1-10

This is now, beloved, the second letter I am writing to you; in them I am trying to arouse your sincere intention by reminding you that you should remember the words spoken in the past by the holy prophets, and the commandment of the Lord and Saviour spoken through your apostles. First of all you must understand this, that in the last days scoffers will come, scoffing and indulging their own lusts and saying, 'Where is the promise of his coming? For ever since our ancestors died, all things continue as they were from the beginning of creation!' They deliberately ignore this fact, that by the word of God heavens existed long ago and an earth was formed out of water and by means of water, through which the world of that time was deluged with water and perished. But by the same word the present heavens and earth have been reserved for fire, being kept until the day of judgement and destruction of the godless.

But do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day. The Lord is not slow about his promise, as some think of slowness, but is patient with you, not wanting any to perish, but all to come to repentance. But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a loud noise, and the elements will be dissolved with fire, and the earth and everything that is done on it will be disclosed.

THE HOLY GOSPEL OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING MATTHEW 21:23-32

People: Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

When he entered the temple, the chief priests and the elders of the people came to him as he was teaching, and said, 'By what authority are you doing these things, and who gave you this authority?' Jesus said to them, 'I will also ask you one question; if you tell me the answer, then I will also tell you by what authority I do these things. Did the baptism of John come from heaven, or was it of human origin?' And they argued with one another, 'If we say, "From heaven", he will say to us, "Why then did you not believe him?" But if we say, "Of human origin", we are afraid of the crowd; for all regard John as a prophet.' So, they answered Jesus, 'We do not know.' And he said to them, 'Neither will I tell you by what authority I am doing these things.

'What do you think? A man had two sons; he went to the first and said, "Son, go and work in the vineyard today." He answered, "I will not"; but later he changed his mind and went. The father went to the second and said the same; and he answered, "I go, sir"; but he did not go. Which of the two did the will of his father?' They said, 'The first.' Jesus said to them, 'Truly I tell you, the tax-collectors and the prostitutes are going into the kingdom of God ahead of you. For John came to you in the way of righteousness and you did not believe him, but the tax-collectors and the prostitutes believed him; and even after you saw it, you did not change your minds and believe him.

SERMON: Fr. Simon

Scope for change

How do we measure faith in the Christian community? We measure it by doing - by obedience, by following through on what we promise to do, by embodying our faith and by making tangible the values that we hold so dear. Otherwise, we are simply hypocrites.

In the Psalm set for today the Psalmist contrasts what the people utter in contrast to what they do. His complaint to God is that "the faithful have vanished from among us" and that "with a smooth tongue they speak from a double heart". In this sense their true failing is that "needy are oppressed, and the poor cry out in misery" as a result of their unfaithfulness and hypocrisy.

That same sentiment is expressed in the parable that Jesus tells in today's Gospel of the two brothers. The first brother is asked by his father to work in the vineyard. He is emphatic in his reply, "I will not", but reconsiders and goes out to do as his father has asked him. The second son – who we assume is a caricature of the chief priests and elders that Jesus is being critical of in the interaction that proceeds the parable – when asked to go and work in the vineyard says yet but fails to follow through. Jesus then asks the question, "Which of the two did the will of his father?" There answer is plain, "The first". Jesus then responds, "Truly I tell you, the tax-collectors and the prostitutes are going into the kingdom of God ahead of you. For John came to you in the way of righteousness and you did not believe him, but the tax-collectors and the prostitutes believed him; and even after you saw it, you did not change your minds and believe him."

While we may take this as a criticism of their hypocrisy we could also read it as an offer of grace – "You can change your mind and choose to walk in obedience if you so wish, but you need to recognise that you are no better than those who you have depicted as below you because of their disobedience." As Peter reminds us, "The Lord is not slow about his promise, as some think of slowness, but is patient with you, not wanting any to perish, but all to come to repentance." Again, this is an invitation to grace and rescues us from two classic human – choosing not to follow but being given a chance to reconsider and choosing to follow but failing in the follow through.

As James (2:14-19) reminds us, "What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and one of you says to them, 'Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill', and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So, faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead. But someone will say, 'You have faith and I have works.' Show me your faith without works, and I by my works will show you my faith. You believe that God is one; you do well. Even the demons believe—and shudder."

Historically Advent was a penitent season because it asked us to "prepare our hearts for the Coming of the Lord". We are reminded yet again that, where we have rebelled against God or failed to live out our promises to God, grace still abounds. That we too can come to a fresh understanding of our faith and renewed call to live out our vocation to live out the kingdom of God by ensuring that the needy are not oppressed and that the poor do not have to cry out in misery, that the naked are clothed and the hungry are fed. Amen
