THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

READING: 1 Peter 2:1-10

A READING FROM THE FIRST BOOK OF PETER

Rid yourselves, therefore, of all malice, and all guile, insincerity, envy, and all slander. Like newborn infants, long for the pure, spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow into salvation—if indeed you have tasted that the Lord is good.

Come to him, a living stone, though rejected by mortals yet chosen and precious in God's sight, and like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. For it stands in scripture: 'See, I am laying in Zion a stone, a cornerstone chosen and precious; and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame.'

To you then who believe, he is precious; but for those who do not believe, 'The stone that the builders rejected has become the very head of the corner', and 'A stone that makes them stumble, and a rock that

makes them fall.' They stumble because they disobey the word, as they were destined to do. But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvellous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy.

HOLY GOSPEL - Matthew 19:23-30

THE HOLY GOSPEL OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING MATTHEW

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Then Jesus said to his disciples, 'Truly I tell you, it will be hard for a rich person to enter the kingdom of heaven. Again, I tell you, it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God.' When the disciples heard this, they were greatly astounded and said, 'Then who can be saved?' But Jesus looked at them and said, 'For mortals it is impossible, but for God all things are possible.'

Then Peter said in reply, 'Look, we have left everything and followed you. What then will we have?' Jesus said to them, 'Truly I tell you, at the renewal of all things, when the Son of Man is seated on the throne of his glory, you who have followed me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And everyone who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or fields, for my name's sake, will receive a hundredfold, and will inherit eternal life. But many who are first will be last, and the last will be first.

SERMON: Fr. Simon

The human predicament and grace

John and Charles Wesley were two of nineteen children born to the Revd. Samuel and Susannah Wesley in Epworth, England. Both pursued theological studies in Oxford, England and joined what they called the "Holy Club" in which they covenanted with each other to live disciplined Christian lives given to serious study of the Bible, prayer, fasting, and charitable works – what fellow students derogatory called Methodists. On the 24th of May 1738 John Wesley heard Psalm 130 being read before he went to a meeting at a Moravian meeting house in Aldersgate Street in London. He wrote in his journal: "In the evening I went very unwillingly to a society in Aldersgate Street, where one was reading Luther's preface to the Epistle to the Romans. About a quarter before nine, while he was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed."

Psalm 130 could best be described as "the human predicament and its dependence upon divine grace." In these few versus we move from complete human despair to the joy and confidence of the work of God in resolving the human predicament through grace.

The Psalm starts with that wonderful description of the human condition and response to God, "Out of the depths have I called you". In the tradition of the Psalms "the depth" is shorthand for the image or metaphor of "the depth of the sea" – that place of deep fear and dread where life overwhelms us and takes the very breath from us. But it places us into a position or posture of prayer – "I called to you". "The depth" is more than simply a state of helplessness where we feel over-whelmed by life. It is also a state of being of our own human making and failing – "what is done amiss" - that requires the possibility of a new beginning to be found in and initiated through forgiveness. So, in verse three it flips from describing the human condition of despair to talk of the human anticipation of faith that God through grace will act to restore or resolve or reignite or reimaging what might be possible – "For there is forgiveness with you".

The Psalm then flips back to the human response that anticipates that transformative grace, "I wait for the Lord; my soul waits for him; *in his word is my hope. My soul waits for the Lord, more than watchmen for the morning, *more than watchmen for the morning." It carries with it the anticipated imagery of a new day and a new beginning, a new possibility and the dawning of a new reality through grace. The Psalm then shifts from the individual Psalmist's voice to an exhortation or a calling out to the crowd in vs. 6&7, "O Israel, wait for the Lord, *for with the Lord there is mercy; With him there is plenteous redemption, *and he shall redeem Israel from all their sins." It reminds us that salvation – the work of God to remedy the human condition through grace – is a corporate or communal experience that transforms the community and world around us. That the kingdom of God is lived out wherever the grace of God is found in human relationships and interaction.

Paul, in 1 Corinthians 15:1-3, writes "Now I should remind you, brothers and sisters of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, ² through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you—unless you have come to believe in vain." He refers to salvation – "being saved" – in the present continues tense to indicate to us that conversion is not simply an event, but a life journey of continues reorientation and dependence on the grace of God. This is not to suggest to us that our salvation is insecure and up for question, but rather that conversion is an ongoing journey of dealing with our human predicament – "continue to be saved" – as we trust in God's gracious dealing with us each and every day. And while we might have those moment in life like John Wesley where we feel "strangely warmed" by the grace and presence of God, the grace of God is an ongoing reality in our lives that constantly rescues us from "the depths" of our human predicament and continuously lifts us to the light of God's presence. Amen
