In February, Susan Cronje and I were offered positions as Lay Associates at St. Margaret's. After much prayer and encouragement I accepted the job. So, what exactly does my new job entail and how is it going so far?

I am to continue the formation and coordination of an already existing pastoral care team, including home and hospital visits, bringing to the incumbent's attention, any special needs or concerns. If you read the Pastoral Care brochure that can be found in the foyer of the church you will see that our team of volunteers is busy and always ready to lend a hand when needed. Throughout the year, I plan to provide on-going Pastoral Care and education where needed.

I am overseeing the ministry to Newcomers. A Newcomer's Ministry Team has been formed and with four heads being better than one, we are coming up with ideas to show people that we at St. Margaret's are a welcoming community. We try to phone and visit newcomers and are in the process of making a parish photo album so that we can get to know each other a little better. I will also make sure that Bible studies for newcomers and old comers happen on a regular basis.

Along with Susan, we will work with the ministry team to establish effective ways to minister to young families. Together we will also develop a better Screening in Faith "approval" process at St. Margaret's.

As Lay Associates, we hope to "empower" you as members of the St. Margaret's family to become more confident in the tasks that the Holy Spirit has for you. A little about Margaret

Margaret grew up in New Brunswick and was part of a very devoted family active in the Church. Her mother was Sunday School Superintendent for many years and a younger brother became a priest. As a result of husband David's work, the Paradis family moved frequently and lived in Quebec, Winnipeg, Coquitlam and Prince George B.C. While in Prince George, Margaret completed a three year program, Education for Ministry.

FIRST COMMUNION Preparation Class Taught by Lorraine Chew

On Easter Sunday twelve children ranging in ages from seven to twelve received their First Communion with family and friends. The children were: Jack Bowskill, Jeremy and Ryan Brister, Camryn and Ian Case, Sydney Devlin, Avery

and Kiley Dixon, Hunter and Kassidy Eagleson, Lauren and Sarah Nelson.

A four week preparation class was taught by Lorraine Chew, assisted by Margaret Paradis and Jen Case, all three who have teaching backgrounds. The text used for the First Communion Course was *Life in the Eucharist*, adapted by the Children's Unit of General Synod for use in the Anglican Church of Canada from Living the Eucharist by Francoise Darcy -Berube and Jean Paul Berube. The study concentrated on the Eucharist, beginning with Jesus at the Last Supper, what the priest does, what happens at the Eucharist and how we can be in communion with others. Because of the diversity of ages, the class was divided into two age groups. All of the children had homework to do and worked very hard.

ST. MARGARET'S DAY APART – LIVING AND SHARING OUR FAITH IN OUR NEIGHBOURHOOD Submitted by Susan Cronje

On Saturday April 5 Bruce Smith the Missional Coordinator for the Anglican Parish of Christ Church St. James in Etobicoke came to lead us in discussion and workshops focused on "Living and Sharing Our Faith in Our Neighbourhood". Twenty five members of St. Margaret's congregation attended the day which included multimedia presentations, small group discussions, and praise and worship music.

The day was divided into three main informative sessions:

Why bother?

But what do we have to offer?

We know what we have to offer, where do we go from here?

As the day progressed we started to understand that we really do have something to share with those people who have yet to hear of Jesus. That we are not required to reform society but rather to demonstrate love and care to society. In Matthew 4:18-23 we read of Jesus calling his first disciples; "Come, follow me", Jesus said, "and I will make you fishers of men." (4:19) We learned that we need to be intentional and willing to take a risk with our own faith i.e. follow Jesus; that we need to be prepared for what we will encounter remaining patient and still at times sensing what the Holy Spirit would have us do. Most important we need to remember that we do not make ourselves fisher of people but that this is the work of God as promised in Matthew 4:19. Cultivating relationships is key to sharing our faith in our neighbourhood through casual conversation; it is not forced but should come naturally. How and where those relationships will begin is not always clear, we need to move out into the neighbourhood and allow God to show us. If this is sounding familiar it is likely that you are now sharing in the missional mindset of our church.

LAY PASTORAL ASSISTANT Submitted by Susan Cronje

In March 2014, I began an exciting journey as a part time Lay Pastoral Assistant here at St. Margaret's Anglican Church. My primary responsibilities include "missional transformation" and "outreach"; other secondary assignments include "Screening in Faith" and exploring new ministries for young families. I first became involved with "Missional Transformation" back in October 2010 when I attended a 6 week course offered by Rev. Beth and Rev. Stephen Pessah entitled "Mission Shaped Intro". The course provided me with a new view of the church; a missional church, a church primarily for the people who have yet to meet Jesus or even understand better who their Jesus is. This excited me as the new model implied that those of us in the church would need first to understand that mission is seeing what God is doing in the world and then joining in. This was contrary to the traditional model I had grown to know in which the Church decides how they will spread the news of Jesus and attract people into the church.

Early in 2012, St. Margaret's was asked to participate in a Diocesan ministry initiative called "Missional Transformation Process" which I got involved in along with other members of St. Margaret's. As you may recall we conducted listening interviews, online surveys, a feedback seminar at our first Parish Day Apart at the Kempenfelt Centre in January 2013, and then small listening groups a year ago. Through all of this we began to better understand who we are as a congregation. In addition, we learned more about what inspired and formed St. Margaret's congregation to

explore new and effective ways to share the Gospel with others. The "Adopt a Park" program became an opportunity for our congregation to go out into our neighbourhood. In committing to caring for the cleanup of Hanmer Park we created an opportunity for us to meet people and to develop new relationships, to listen and discover what God is up to in their lives. The missional transformation process requires that we continue to explore other opportunities to connect with the people in our neighbourhood, to listen and discern their needs and to grow better in understanding our role in God's mission.

In many ways outreach initiatives are missional opportunities too; as we serve those with a need we may develop a relationship which leads to deeper discussions. As we demonstrate love and care through our listening and actions we may actually discover what God is up to and in time be given the opportunity to share our faith story i.e. tell the stories of Jesus. My own outreach ministry began many years ago in South Africa where I worked for the National Centre for Occupational Health in Johannesburg, taught in Colleges and later served as a Lay Reader in St. Mary's Anglican Church located in the province of Zululand. Years later when I returned to Canada I took up positions with The South American Missionary Society (SAMS) and Samaritan House Community Ministries (SHCM), engaging in many initiatives at St. Margaret's.

Outreach has always been a big part of who we are at St. Margaret's; the programs have changed over the years

reflecting the needs and the relationships we have had in the community e.g. Barrie Food Bank, Christmas Hampers, Rainbows, Breakfast Program, Missions to Haiti and Guatemala, Operation Christmas Child, to name a few. A new outreach committee is now looking at different ways of connecting with the community. Recently 31 people from St. Margaret's attended the 2nd Annual Bowls for Beds event a fundraiser for SHCM. A drive in early May to collect blankets, sleeping bags, tarps and tents was coordinated with West Bayfield Elementary School and the David Busby Street Centre to help the homeless. We are now also busy investigating volunteer opportunities with West Bayfield Elementary School; perhaps this is an area of interest to you?

As volunteers we are given the opportunity to model the love of Christ to seek and serve members of our community who often are vulnerable due to age, infirmity or particular circumstances of dependency. The "Screening in Faith Policy" for the Diocese of Toronto requires that we at St. Margaret's acknowledge volunteering as a sacred trust which must be responsibly and safely managed. To this end, St. Margaret's is required to train, mentor and maintain records of volunteers and their responsibilities and when necessary request police record checks. This is a ministry that Margaret Paradis and I share in our new roles as Lay Assistants to Rev. Stephen. Another area that we

are working together on is the young family ministry discovering further the needs of families with young children and ensuring they are met.

It is now 15 years ago that my husband and I together with our two children and then 2 dogs immigrated to Canada and joined St. Margaret's Anglican Church. Our children Katie and Alex are now young adults making their own way in the world allowing Roelie, my husband and I more time to focus on our interests. As many of you know Roelie is a committed athlete and will enter his second Half Ironman race this September. Although I do not race, I do try to provide support in all ways. He loves to tell the story of me expressing how tired I was after his first triathlon race in Welland. It was only after I told him I had to run after him photographing him in all the events that he realized I too had run a race of my own that day. This past year I have returned to university to study theology on a part time basis. I have taken 4 courses at Wycliffe and am now contemplating commitment to further studies. Study and learning has always been a big part of my life and has enabled me to move in new directions. Twenty five years ago Roelie and I met in a classroom at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine in England doing post graduate studies. It was Roelie who brought me back to Christ so many years ago and together we seek direction from God for our family and our life journey forward.


CONNECTION

FACES OF ST. MARGARET A Conversation with Maureen Daley

Maureen grew up in Thunder Bay in a family with three brothers and her extended family is still in that city. Being the only girl in the family encouraged Maureen to develop strength and flexibility, defending herself against her brothers when they liked to use her for snowball target practice. Maureen studied nursing at Confederation College and after graduating in 1982, worked in long term care. She moved to Toronto in 1988, roomed with a friend and worked in stroke rehabilitation at Credit Valley Hospital in Mississauga. A back injury led Maureen to consider other areas of nursing and she moved on to Sick Kids Hospital in Toronto. Twenty-five years later she is still there and now works in orthopedic surgery. Maureen says that Sick Kids is an extraordinary place for staff and patients and although she has to commute, she would not want to work anywhere else.



Maureen met husband Trevor in Toronto and after Joseph their eldest son was born, they moved to Barrie to find a better environment in which to raise children. A busy time followed with the birth of Hillary and Adam. Maternity leaves were shorter then and Trevor worked part time and assumed many responsibilities at home. Maureen came from a Roman Catholic background, while Trevor was Seventh Day Adventist. They looked around for a church home where both could find some common ground and walked into St. Margaret's in 1995, at that time in a portable. Both the late Joyce Bertelsen and Jean Jones welcomed Maureen like a daughter. Rev. Warren Leibovitch, the priest at the time, invited the family to attend and visited them in their home.

The Daley family became part of St. Margaret's. Adam the youngest was baptized, the children attended Sunday School and Maureen began to sing in the choir. One day at a pancake supper, Maureen helped out and was thanked profusely by older parish members who had assumed responsibility for hospitality and social events. As a result, Maureen gradually started to assist planning and organizing social events. She looks back fondly on such events as a Caribbean Night, an Italian Night, a Jazz and Dessert Evening as well as efforts assisting regular St. Margaret's dinner evenings, the Christmas Dinner and Mystery Night Dinners.

Fundraising is a constant factor in many parishes but Maureen feels that it is important to also just have opportunities for fun and fellowship, to assist in encouraging that warm family feeling that was such a vital part of St. Margaret's in the early days. This spring on May 31st, the Spring Fling Garage Sale and Barbecue will have a

fundraising component but also will encourage the surrounding community to come and participate. Plans are underway for a special Ladies Tea in June at the English and Miller Tea House in downtown Barrie, a family picnic June 22nd at St. Vincent's Park after the church service and perhaps an Octoberfest Evening in the fall.

As the Out of Cold Program came to an end April 30, a number of people are now without shelter in Barrie. The St. Margaret's Outreach Committee collaborated with staff at West Bayfield Elementary School (WBES) to collect sleeping bags, tents, tarps and blankets for the homeless.

The purpose of the drive was to collect and then hand over these items to the David Busby Street Centre (DBSC) who would distribute the items to those most in need. The DBSC Outreach Van arrived on a rainy evening Thursday May 15th to collect the numerous donated blankets, sleeping bags, tarps, and tents. It was heartwarming to hear Sue McVeay and Stacey Daoust of the DBSC Community Outreach comment how excited they were as they had just handed out the last of their supplies.

Thank you to everyone who donated items and especially to those who volunteered to make this event happen. We look forward to partnering with WBES and other local organizations with future outreach activities.

GETTING US OVER THE TOP - MEETING THE CHALLENGE

We have been very grateful to have entered into this three year agreement with the Diocese. In year 1 and in year 2 we have met our benchmarks and have been forgiven over \$320,000 of capital debt on both the church and the rectory. Our Parish has worked extremely hard and we are proud of our achievements. Our challenge was to take us over the finish line. With just 2 months to our deadline we needed to raise \$15,000. Some thought that this was an impossible goal to achieve. However, St Margaret's always finds a way to overcome adversity. We communicated our status so that everyone knew where we stood to our goal. On behalf of Rev. Steve, Peter, Joy and myself I am proud to let you know that we achieved our goal and we have now completed our 3 year agreement with the Diocese. We didn't just achieve our goal at the end of May but we surpassed it. Here are the results:

WE STAYED CURRENT WITH OUR MONTHLY PAYMENTS TO THE DIOCESE as of May 31st.

WE REPAID OUR OPERATING DEBT

THE \$15,000 CHALLENGE

WE RAISED \$16,233.32 FROM 52 DONATIONS

AS A RESULT THE DIOCESE WILL FORGIVE US AN ADDITIONAL \$120,000 + ON OUR CAPITAL DEBT FOR THE CHURCH.

Having over achieved our goal of \$15,000 is fantastic and that 52 separate donations contributed to the total. It shows the commitment of our Parish family and the love that they have for St. Margaret's I wanted to share with you some contents of an email we received from Arch Deacon Elizabeth Hardy, from the Diocesan Office

"I would like to congratulate St. Margaret. You have done an excellent job with your debt forgiveness. You have been rigorous in meeting your bench marks and honouring your commitments. This has resulted in a reduction of your debt but also in greater financial health and stewardship education for your parish. I would be pleased to discuss with the Director of Finance and Bishop Fenty the possibility of extending this plan for another one year term. Once Ms. Rogers and I have had a chance to analyze our facility to absorb any more write downs on this debt I will be back in touch with a suggestion. Once again congratulations to the entire leadership team and the congregation. Best regards. E+"

When we began this journey our Church Operating and Capital debt surpassed \$1,000,000. Three years later our debt is in the \$460,000 range. What a fantastic achievement! We are committed to reducing our Operating Debt until it is no more. We look forward to discussing our next steps, with the Diocese and how, together, we can partner moving forward. There may be more opportunities for future debt forgiveness.
